

DOUG JENNINGS PARK ONGOING REHABILITATION PROJECT

Delivering our plan to *Sustain, Enhance* and *Promote* Gold Coast Waterways



About the Project

As part of the ongoing maintenance program for Doug Jennings Park, the Gold Coast Waterways Authority (GCWA) will be rehabilitating an area of the Doug Jennings Park reserve known as the Spit Finger. The works will involve resurfacing the road, creating formalised parking areas, installing vehicle barriers and revegetating the degraded areas. Once the works are complete, the southern two thirds of the Spit Finger will be managed as a day use area and vehicular access will be limited to day-light hours. All-hours pedestrian access for the public will be maintained.

Impacts of the Project

- The Spit Finger will be closed to the public for May, June and July while the rehabilitation works are underway.

- Once complete, vehicles will be unable to access the dunal areas

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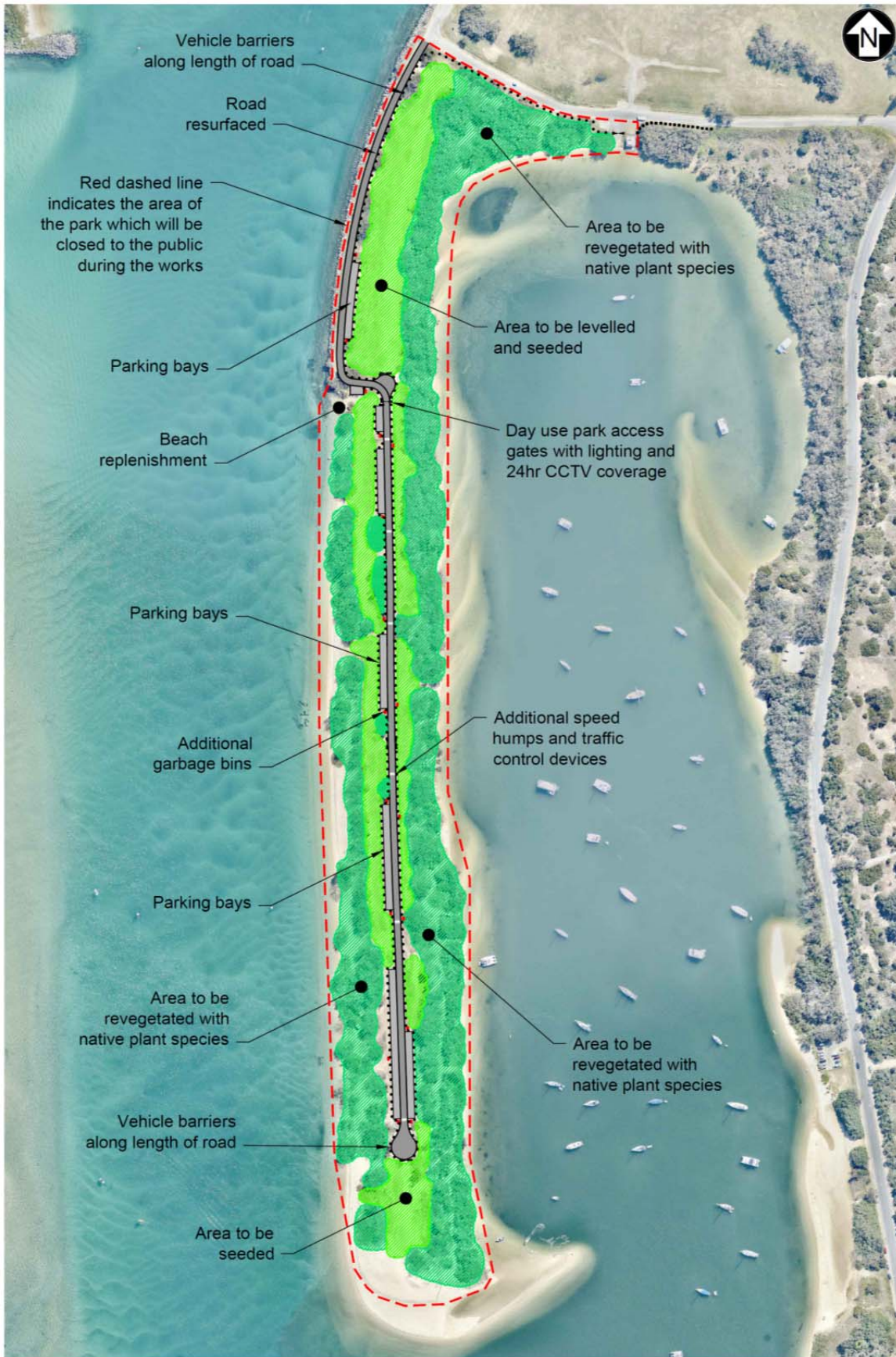


Figure 1. Proposed Rehabilitation Works

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
